The department has submitted materials for approval of a new course, ECON 424 – Computational Finance and Financial Econometrics. The application has been approved by A&S, and we are awaiting approval from the University.

This course meets the department's theoretical and quantitative requirements to be included as a Theory & Methods course for the Bachelor of Science degree program, and includes a considerable amount of mathematics. This course was previously taught under an alternative course number, ECON 483 – Applied Econometrics, which is approved as a Theory & Methods course.

Currently, the Bachelor of Science program requires that a student take ECON 300 & 301, an advanced topics course (ECON 400 or 401), 10 credits of theory & methods (435, 473, 481, 482, 483, 485, 486) and 15 credits of additional 400-level ECON courses. Including ECON 424 in the options will help the BS students to finish their requirements in a timely manner.

65 credits as follows:

- 1. Admission to the major.

A minimum of 50 credits in economics, including ECON 200, ECON 201; ECON 300, ECON 301; ECON 400 or ECON 401; at least 10 additional credits chosen from the following courses: ECON 400 or ECON 401, ECON 435, ECON 473, ECON 481 (or equivalent), ECON 482, ECON 483, ECON 485, ECON 486; at least 15 additional credits at the 400 level, excluding ECON 496, ECON 497, and ECON 499.
- 4. Grades of 2.0 or better in ECON 200, ECON 201, ECON 300, and ECON 301.
- 5. Transfer students are required to complete a minimum of 25 upper-division economics credits in residence at the UW.

Major Requirements

65 credits as follows:
