These changes to our admissions requirements will enable us to admit students earlier in their undergraduate career, and to encourage the development of those analytic writing skills that are emphasized in all of our courses. At present, the three core course requirement for admission is taking students much time to complete, and thus they are applying to the major as late as their senior year. We are reducing the admissions requirements from three core courses to one core course to enable earlier application. In addition, we plan to reserve seats in each of these core courses for sophomores and transfers. This way, students will be able to apply to the major as mid- to late-sophomores or early-juniors. This provides us a means to ensure that students move through the course sequence in the expected fashion. It also enables students unable to gain admission adequate time to pursue another major. The added requirement for English composition will help ensure that students possess the capacity to succeed with the high number of writing assignments typical of our courses.

Admission Requirements:

- 1. A minimum cumulative GPA of 2.00.
- 2. Completion of one research methods or statistics class. See the program's Web site or adivsing office for a list of approved courses.
- 3. Completion of three of the following courses with a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.50: LIS 320/POL S 368 or approved substitute; LSJ/POL S 367; POL S/LSJ 363; LSJ 375 or approved substitute:
- 4. Admission is competitive, based on the following: GPA, with emphasis on grades received in courses required for admission (applicants accepted normally present cumulative GPAs considerably above 2.50); personal statement representing the student's interest in and commitment to becoming a law, societies, and justice major; other evidence of a commitment to the study of society, justice, and law. Junior standing preferred.
- 5. Admission is twice a year during spring and autumn quarters. Students admitted in the spring begin the Law, Societies, and Justice major in the autumn; students admitted in the autumn begin the Law, Societies, and Justice major in the winter. The application deadline is the second Friday of spring or autumn quarter; admission decisions are made by the end of the fifth week of the quarter.

Admission Requirements:

- 1. A minimum cumulative GPA of 2.00.
- 2. Completion of one research methods or statistics class. See the program's Web site or advising office for a list of approved courses.

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- 3. Completion of one of the following courses: LSJ 320/POL S 368, LSJ 321/or approved substitute; LSJ/POL S 367; POL S/LSJ 363; LSJ 375 or SOC 372.
- 4. Evidence of skill in written communication: one English Composition is required. A second writing intensive class is recommended (e.g. ENGL 198 or a writing course in the social sciences).
- 5. Admission is competitive, based on the following: GPA, with emphasis on the core course(s) listed above (applicants accepted normally present cumulative GPAs considerably above 2.50); personal statement representing the student's interest in and commitment to becoming a Law, Societies, and Justice major; other evidence of a commitment to the study of society, justice, and law.
- 6. Admission is three times a year during autumn, winter and spring quarters. Students begin the Law, Societies, and Justice major in the quarter following their admission. The application deadline is the second Friday of the quarter; admission decisions are made by the end of the fifth week of the quarter.
