Attachment A Rationale for Ending the Minor in Public Health

Rationale for Ending the Minor in Public Health

The SPH&CM wants to eliminate the undergraduate minor in public health as of Winter 2008 and make selected changes in requirements for those who are current minors to facilitate their completion of required courses by Spring 2010.

The reasons for eliminating the minor are:

- 1. The minor was originally established to offer an opportunity for undergraduates who were interested in public health to have a guided program of study. In its early years only 5-10 minors were actively registered at any one point in time. The original need no longer exists as the SPH&CM and General Studies now offer an undergraduate major in public health and a proposal to offer an undergraduate minor and major in global health is in development.
- 2. The original minor required minimal staffing and had little if any impact on other courses because of the small number of students. There are currently more than 75 students who are declared minors in addition to the 75 students who are currently declared majors. The major is capped at 75 students but there are no administrative or academic controls of students who wish to declare the minor. Therefore the minor could continue to grow significantly in the near future if it continues to be an option for undergraduates. At even the current numbers they far exceed the School's ability to provide adequate advising support and required courses.
- 3. This increased number of majors and minors has also begun to cause significant overloading of those courses that are required in both the major and minor, specifically HSERV 480, MHE 417, EPI 420 and ENVH 311. At least one of these departments has recently informed the SPH&CM that it's preference is that their course no longer be required for both the major and minor. Other departments are expressing similar pressures.
- 4. The SPH&CM has a priority to continue to offer the major as that creates the preferred route to graduate school and eventual careers in public health.

Changes that are being proposed in requirements for the minor are designed to facilitate the completion of the minor by those students who are currently declared as public health minors. It is currently very difficult for them to get the required courses as they are often filled with those students who have priority such as MHE minors in MHE 417, Environmental Health majors in Environmental Health and Public Health majors in HSERV 480.

The current requirements for the minor are shown in Attachment B and the proposed revised curriculum is shown in Attachment C. Specific changes that are being recommended are:

- 1. Drop MHE 417 as a required course because that program is no longer able to quarantee public health students access to the course.
- 2. Drop HSERV 480 (3) as a required course and substitute the requirement of either HSERV 481 (2) or HSERV 482 (2)
- 3. Drop the current list of approved electives and substitute the revised list of approved electives including credits from three areas of study, anthropology, psychology, and sociology. This would assure that students who have earned the minor at least have introductory studies in cores areas of the social and behavioral sciences that are critical in understanding the determinants of health related behavior. It would also give the students much greater flexibility in selecting and completing the elective requirements for the minor.
