I. The addition of SIS 201 conforms to larger revisions for all major sequences in the School of International Studies.							
II. To keep the number of required credits (beyond foreign language) at 50, and at the same time permit each country/area faculty to retain a "second Asian civilization" requirement or a "thematic/cross-regional course requirement" according to faculty preference, the six concentrations are restructured. Students will now accomplish the second 5 credits of existing requirement #3, <u>OR</u> existing requirement #4, within the slightly-expanded concentration requirement (new requirement #5, now 35 credits). See attached chart for an explanation of how this adjustment will apply in practice. III. SISSA 200 (South Asia Today) is added as eligible civilization course for students in the South Asia concentration.							
IV. References to "option" are replaced with "concentration" to bring the major into compliance with current usage.
