This application proposes a reorganization of the Latin American Studies minor so that its categories and course lists are parallel to those now used in major (substantially revised Autumn Quarter 2005). The three broad course groupings in the minor will be (1) history; (2) contemporary Latin America; and (3) electives. In addition, this application replaces detailed citation of acceptable courses with references to lists that will be maintained on a web page. We believe the result will be equally acceptable for advising (and self-advising) purposes, and far simpler from an administrative standpoint.
