I am in favor of this proposal. The economic and cultural importance of this part of the world speaks for itself. It is vital that students in technical and social sciences who plan to work in this part of the world have a clear pathway to gaining practical language skills, while at the same time not having to commit to a full Major.

In addition I have personally interacted with faculty in the context of a South Asian language course during the 2007-2008 academic year. A very high level of student motivation and graduate student and faculty professionalism was evident. Several students obtained competitive positions in summer language programs overseas.

In addition, there are significant numbers of Washington residents from these language groups, and this is an opportunity to develop a program with robust appeal to alumni and families in the region.
