General Information

The study of international security focuses on the relationship between politics and security, and specifically on the causes of war and the use and control of force: threats, promises, and the tactics, techniques, and ethics of violence. It teaches the theories and the historical context for understanding contemporary security issues.

This track is recommended to students who are interested in an in-depth study of international security. It is an option program of study and not an official college major or minor. Students who elect to follow the International Security Option must meet both the Option requirements and the 50-credit requirement for the Political Science Major. The courses listed below that are not in political science fulfill elective or distribution coursework for the option; they do not automatically count for political science major credit.

If you complete the 45-credit international security option you will receive the notation *International Security Option* on your transcript after you graduate and a certificate. No more than 25 credits can be used to double-count for the option and the Political Science Major; no more than 25 credits can be used to double-count with other majors.

This proposed option appears to only require 10 credits at the upper-division level. I suggest that at least half of the 45 credits needed for the option be at the 300-level or above.

We have adjusted the requirements so that at least 25 credits of the option must be upper-division courses:

45 credits as follows:

- A. Pol S 203, Introduction to International Relations
- B. Pol S 321, American Foreign Policy Pol S 407, International Security
- C. 30 additional credits from an approved list of courses maintained in the department. At least 15 elective credits must be at the 300 or 400 level.

MATTHEW SPARKE

Given the narrowed national focus of this Option on US military politics and policy, and especially given that it does not address international health security or international environmental security, it surely ought to have a more focused title such as: "Option in American Military Policy".

International Security was chosen as the title of the option because it is the major sub-field in the study of International Relations. Although we have no objection to an option in American Military Policy, it would require us to drop two of the three required courses and at least 28 of the optional advanced courses. Courses that range from "game theory, evolution, and behavior," "international justice," "political Islam and Islmaic fundamentalism," "Religion and World Politics," "International Law and Arms Control" does not strike us as either narrow or focused on American Military Policy. Courses on international environmental security or international health security would certainly qualify for the option, and we welcome suggestions of courses to add to the list of electives. For this reason we include the statement: "Other courses related to international security topics may apply. Please consult with advisers."

We created the option in response to student demand. We have found that our undergraduates want to learn more about international security and have asked if they can major in it. The International Security Option will give students a menu of courses that will allow them to pursue their interests and will also allow them to develop expertise that might help them in landing a job or entering graduate study.

Of the three required courses, only one addresses the US exclusively.

The optional advanced courses also do not strike me as narrow. Nine courses either focus on the U.S., U.S. wars and history, relations between the U.S. and another country, or specifically on strategy and doctrine. However, 28 courses do NOT focus on the United States.
