EXPLANATION OF AND RATIONALE FOR PROPOSED CHANGE

The two primary reasons for these changes are (1) enhancing achievement of our Learning Goals and (2) bringing our requirements in line with our revised Mission Statement and the growth of the discipline of Women Studies. (1) The Learning Goals require students to increase (a) the range of scholarship they are accountable for, (b) the sophistication of their analytic skills and (c) development of their written and verbal skills. To accomplish these goals, we re-designed our courses to build on each other. (2) The discipline's knowledge base has rapidly increased and gained more coherence. The increased pre-requisites and limitations on courses which count toward the major are designed to guide students through this scholarship more systematically.

Women Studies Major Requirements

Requirement for the entrance to the Major is 2.0 GPA for students declaring the major in the Fall Quarter 2009 or later

- 1. WOMEN 200 <u>Introduction to Women Studies</u> or transfer equivalent (5 cr.). Women 200 is a prerequisite for most other Women Studies courses.
- 2. Women 299 <u>Women Studies Colloquium for Current and Prospective Majors</u> (2 cr.). (majors only Period I; add codes from advisor Period II,III)
- 3. One elective 200-level course in Women Studies or transfer equivalent (5 cr.)
- 4. Women 300 Gender, Race, and Class in Social Stratification. (5 cr.) Prerequisite: WOMEN 200. Women 300 is a prerequisite for the senior capstone and variable credit courses (494, 495, 497, and 499).
- 5. One course on feminist theory (5 cr.).

Select one of the following:

- o WOMEN 206 Philosophies of Feminism
- WOMEN 455 <u>Contemporary Feminist Theory</u> (strongly recommended for students who plan to pursue graduate studies). <u>Recommended: WOMEN 206</u>
 Prerequisite: WOMEN 200

Note: if 200-level course is used to fulfill this requirement, it MAY NOT also be used to fulfill the additional 200-level course requirement noted above in #3.

- 6. One upper division course focusing on transnational perspective from the following list:
 - o 305 Feminism in an International Context
 - o 333 Gender and Globalization: Theory and Process
 - o 339 Social Movements in Contemporary India
 - o 345 Women and International Economic Development

- 7. WOMEN 497 Internship (A minimum of 3 credits are required.) One may take up to 12 additional credits for a total of 15 possible credits. Only ten credits can be applied to the elective upper-division Women Studies credits. Please see #8 of the major requirements for more information.

 Prerequisites: WOMEN 200, 299, & 300.
- 8. 25 elective upper-division (300-400 level) Women Studies credits. 15 credits must be graded (not CR/NC). A maximum of 10 credits from our variable credit courses (495, 496, 497, and 499) can be applied toward this requirement. (Honors Students: Please inquire about possible limits on number of CR/NC courses you may take.)
- 9. WOMEN 494 <u>Senior Capstone</u> (5 cr.)

 <u>Prerequisites: WOMEN 200, 299, 300 and 15 graded credits of Women Studies upper division courses.</u>
