Proposed changes to the American Ethic Studies (AES) major requirements [The total credits required to graduate with an AES Bachelor of Arts degree totals 60 units (NO CHANGE): 1. CORE COURSES The present requirements for the AES majors in the CORE courses consists of 35 credits: 15 AES credit introductory courses in the ethnic specific areas [ AES 150, AES 151, and AES 212 - NO CHANGE], 15 credits of AFRAM 101, AAS 101, and CHSTU 101 [NO CHANGE], and 5 AES credits in either AES 495, Senior Seminar, or AES 496 Senior Thesis [CHANGE]. of an extended research paper or humanities project by offering concentrated and individualized attention to the student under the tutelage of an appropriate AES faculty or Adjunct faculty. The AES Honors student will accomplish this by taking a PROPOSED [see attached proposal] AES 496 Honors Senior Thesis class (5 credits) to research and write an extended paper or initiate and finish a humanities oriented project (e.g. poetry portfolio, DVD documentary, art portfolio).

b) The faculty expects that the number of AES major students will increase as well as student demands for enrollment from University of Washington general students, and we have faced for some time the inability to increase our teaching faculty. Second, even with a department composed of twelve faculty positions, two members are joint appointments with a very limited teaching schedule in the AES Department. Third, in 2009 the College of Arts and Sciences constituted an AES Graduate program committee to make recommendations for the creation of a graduate degree program. Its report is due by the 2009 Spring quarter with, we expect, a probable affirmative response. The faculty already anticipates the need for an extraordinary commitment of time and resources to create and staff new graduate Courses while maintaining the required course curriculum required for the undergraduate AES major.

The increase to the Concentration area from 25 to 30 credits allows for the necessary credit requirement for an AES major to remain at 60 units.

Rationale: The AES faculty proposes an AES Departmental Honors program for exceptional and selected AES majors. We will continue to offer AES 496, with a course change from "Senior Thesis" to "Honors Senior Thesis." The course will not change in content; however, students must apply for and accepted into the AES Departmental Honors program before being allowed to take AES 496. [See the attached Course Change application form.]

Other requirements, such as designating existing AES upper-division courses as an "Ad Hoc Honors" courses is in line with the requirements of the UW Honors program and does not require course change applications.

The Departmental Honors program proposal is presently with the UW Honors Program Committee.

## Minor

The averages for the last 4 years are: 160 majors and 76 graduates. There is a strong indication that these numbers will be increasing in the near future. For example, in AY 2005-2006 we counted 174 majors; in AY 2006-2007, 153; in AY 2007-2008, 132; and in AY 2008-2009, 184. The decline we experienced between 2006 and 2008 was due in part to some problems that seriously impacted the performance of the advising office, which we have now resolved. It must also be noted that in recent years AES has suffered the loss of several faculty members: two Professors, one Associate Professor, and one Assistant Professor. Only the Assistant Professor has been replaced.

2) How will the Departmental Honors track vary from the non-Honors track?

The AES Honors track targets high-achieving majors who, in general, intend to pursue a graduate or professional degree. Only students holding a minimum of a 3.5 overall gpa and a 3.7 gpa in the major are eligible to apply for the Honors track. The AES Honors Committee evaluates applications and makes pertinent recommendations. Students accepted into the Honors Program will be required to take 10 credits of ad-hoc honors courses and write a 20-30 pages Honors thesis under the supervision of a faculty.

AES non-Honors students will comply with all requirements for the major but, obviously, will not have to write a formal senior thesis or take ad-hoc honors courses. Instead of taking the senior seminar or writing a senior thesis, all non-Honors majors will be required to take an additional 5- cr. upper-division course in their area of concentration; in general, these courses involve the writing of a substantive research paper.

3) Please explain how removing the senior seminar and thesis from non-honors students will impact students and the effect on academic rigor.

This change should not have a negative impact on non-Honors AES majors. As explained above, instead of taking the senior seminar or writing a senior thesis, all non-Honors AES majors will be required to take an additional 5-cr. upper-division course in their area of concentration (African American, Asian American, Chicano/a, or Comparative Ethnic Studies). In general, requirements in these upper-division courses include the writing of a substantive research paper. Thus, the academic rigor of the major is not compromised. In fact, this substitution will give students a chance to broaden their breadth of knowledge within their area of focus. Moreover, non-Honors students are encouraged to take AES 499, Independent Studies, and work individually with a faculty on a project involving a lengthy paper.
