# EXPLANATION OF AND RATIONALE FOR PROPOSED CHANGE

The curriculum changes have these goals:

- Integrate the journalism emphasis more tightly into the broader communication major. This would be accomplished by requiring more course work within Communication. Journalism students now take 45 communication credits; that number will increase to 59 Communication credits. Journalism students now take only one of the two foundational courses for the major; under the new requirements, they would be required to take the same foundational courses (Com 201 and Com 202) as other
- Require more course work within a reduced number of potential areas of substantive concentration. Journalism students now must take 10 credits in one of six areas of concentration. Under the new requirements, they would be required to complete 15 science/technology communication.
- Emphasize multimedia storytelling more explicitly in all core journalism courses.
- · Require journalism students to take a capstone practicum course in multimedia storytelling.
- Provide journalism students with experience dealing with audiences as an influence on or creator of news and information.
