The minor in Politics is designed for students who seek to strengthen their facility with political reasoning and theory in a way that complements their studies in their chosen majors/concentrations. Students learn to analyze how political ideas and processes influence and shape domestic and international issues. Students also acquire the skills and knowledge necessary for being informed and effective participants in political processes.

Students minoring in Politics take two core classes, and supplement these with three additional courses intended to deepen and apply their knowledge of politics. In this way, students minoring in Politics learn to analyze how political ideas and processes influence events in their major fields of study.

Requirements

The Politics minor requires 25 credits of coursework: 10 credits of two (choose two out of three) required foundational classes (TPOL S 202: Introduction to American Politics, TPOL S 203 Introduction to International Relations, and TPOL S 201: Introduction to Political Values and Ideas); and 15 credits in three additional electives at the 300- or 400-level that develop a more advanced understanding of politics. A course list follows. Students may request to transfer up to 10 credits to be applied toward the courses fulfilling the minor. Students must maintain an average GPA of 2.0 in the five classes that satisfy the minor requirements. Students in the Politics, Philosophy and Economics concentration may not minor in Politics.

Proposal for Minor in Politics

Interdisciplinary Arts and Sciences
University of Washington Tacoma

(Note: Students majoring in Politics, Philosophy and Economics may not also minor in Politics)

Objectives of Minor

- To strengthen students' ability to discuss and write critically about significant political events and developments, both domestic and international.
- To develop students' understanding of how current events and contemporary political institutions have resulted from long-term political processes, and are reflective of political ideologies.
- To improve students' understanding of how politics and political ideology influence social movements, both in the U.S. and abroad.

Course Requirements

The Politics minor requires 25 credits: 10 credits of two (choose two out of three) required foundational classes (American Politics, International Relations, Introduction to Political Values and Ideas); and 15 credits in three additional electives at the 300- or 400-level. A course list follows. Students may request to transfer up to 10 credits to be applied toward the courses fulfilling the minor. Students must maintain an average GPA of 2.0 in the five classes that satisfy the minor requirements.

Educational Objectives (What students will do after graduation)

Graduates with a minor in politics will have a solid understanding of political ideas, processes, and outcomes. Students will be prepared to pursue careers in government, law, planning, nonprofit management, community work, diplomacy, business, teaching, journalism and other fields, as well as for graduate study in these areas.

Educational Outcomes (What students should be able to do at time of graduation)

Students with a minor in politics will be equipped to understand political and social interactions, relations between states and capital, as well as the history of relationships between governments and citizens. The minor also aims to develop skills needed for informed and effective citizenship at all levels.

Students completing a minor in politics should be able to

- Engage in and employ sophisticated theoretical reasoning to analyze issues related to politics
- Analyze and explain the politics behind current events
- Investigate the relationship between politics and other areas of inquiry
- Discuss and write critically about domestic and international political and social issues

Required University Documentation

Explanation and Rationale for Proposed Minor in Politics

Because of the growing complexity and globalization of our world, it is very important today that students develop a solid understanding of political ideas, processes, and outcomes. The need for improved understanding of politics is evident in domestic debates about health care, immigration, environmental protection, homeland security, and banking regulation as well as international issues such as terrorism, the role of United States in the international system, the spread of democracy and human rights, global poverty and global health issues.

The politics minor allows UWT students to strengthen their facility with political reasoning and theory in a way that will complement their studies in their chosen majors/concentrations. Specific areas of study that would benefit from a politics minor include environmental studies, history, communications, business, social work and urban studies. More substantially, the politics minor will help students become more informed about and engaged with domestic, national, and international issues.

Current course work in politics primarily supports Interdisciplinary Arts and Science's Politics, Philosophy and Economics (PPE) major. This minor allows a greater number of students to benefit from the coursework in the PPE curriculum that centers on politics, while not requiring students to explicitly develop the understanding and critical thinking required by the entire PPE curriculum. Additionally, providing students with a better grounding in politics will support those students interested in being able to teach political science or social studies as high school teachers.

Proposed Catalog Copy

Graduates with a minor in Politics develop an understanding of the role of politics in their major field of study. Students learn to analyze how political ideas and processes influence and shape domestic and international issues. Students also acquire the skills and knowledge necessary for being informed and effective participants in political processes.
