

Dual-Degree Program

Admission Requirements

Dual-degree majors first apply to the architecture program and must meet architecture admission requirements. Admitted architecture students apply to the construction management program during spring quarter of their junior year (first year in the architecture program). For architecture students, construction management prerequisites are waived, but such students must take <u>CM</u> 313 and <u>CM</u> 323 prior to the construction management application deadline, April 1.

Dual Degree Program Requirements

139-142 credits, as follows:

- Architecture Foundation Courses (60 credits): <u>ARCH 300</u>, <u>ARCH 301</u>, <u>ARCH 302</u>, <u>ARCH 315</u>, <u>ARCH 320</u>, <u>ARCH 321</u>, <u>ARCH 322</u>, <u>ARCH 380</u>, <u>ARCH 400</u>, <u>ARCH 401</u>, <u>ARCH 402</u>, <u>ARCH 431</u>, <u>ARCH 460</u>.
- Architecture Selectives (6 credits): 3 credits of graphic/media selective chosen from among the following BIM-recommended courses: <u>ARCH 316</u>, <u>ARCH 410</u>, <u>ARCH 412</u>, <u>ARCH 413</u>, <u>ARCH 415</u>, <u>ARCH 418</u>, <u>ARCH 478</u>, <u>ARCH 481</u>, <u>ARCH 482</u>, <u>ARCH 484</u>, <u>ARCH 485</u>, <u>ARCH 486</u>, <u>ARCH 498</u>. 3 credits of history/theory selective from among the following courses: <u>ARCH 441</u>, <u>ARCH 442</u>, <u>ARCH 450</u>, <u>ARCH 452</u>, <u>ARCH 455</u>, <u>ARCH 457</u>.
- Construction Management/Business Courses (64-73 credits): MGMT 300, CM 301 or B CMU 301, CM 310, CM 311, CM 312, CM 313, CM 321, CM 322, CM 323, CM 331, CM 332, CM 333, CM 334, CM 410, CM 411, CM 412, CM 421, CM 422, CM 423, CM 431 (capstone experience, minimum grade of 2.0 to graduate), CM 432, CM 433, B CMU 301.
- 4. Construction/Construction Science Electives (6-3 credits): Two-One of the following courses: CM 404, CM 414, CM 415, CM 420, CM 425, CM 430 or ARCH 420.

Note: A minimum of 225 credits is required to complete a dual degree.

Department of Construction Management Continuation Policy

The Department of Construction Management wants every student admitted to be successful in the program. At the same time, the Department is responsible for upholding academic standards and making good use of limited resources. This continuation policy specifies the rules students must follow to make satisfactory progress in the major. In addition, we encourage our students to be proactive about seeking advice from their academic advisers or faculty for problems affecting performance or participation in the program.

All students are subject to general University policies regarding grades and credits. The University requires students to keep a 2.0 cumulative GPA; if a course is repeated, both grades are counted in the GPA. No course required for the degree may be taken S/NS. In addition, the Department requires a 2.5 cumulative GPA for all required upper division courses taken within the College of Built Environments and a grade of at least 2.0 in CM 431, Project Management II, which is the Department's Capstone Course.

Academic Advising

All construction management majors may seek academic advising as often as they wish but are encouraged to see an adviser at least once a year. Required advising appointments are:

- During any probation quarter, no later than the fifth week of instruction.
- Upon the request of an adviser or a faculty member. The Department wants to help students do well in the program. Students may be required to meet with an adviser or a faculty member to discuss performance or continuation in the major if a review of student records indicates a possible problem.

Satisfactory Progress

At the end of each quarter, the Department reviews the performance of all undergraduate students and assesses their academic standing. Students will be notified in writing of academic warning, probation, or drop as soon as practical after receiving the grade reports for the previous quarter. Each notice of academic warning or probation will be noted in the student's file. The following sanctions may be rendered against a student whose academic performance falls below the Department's standard for making satisfactory progress.

Low Quarterly Grades: Students, who do not meet the low scholarship criteria but have a quarterly GPA below 2.5, receive written notification encouraging them to talk to an adviser about any academic difficulties that they are having. This is intended to help students solve academic problems before reaching low scholarship status.

Low Scholarship/Probation: Students will be placed on academic probation at the end of any quarter in which their cumulative GPA for upper division courses taken within the College of Built Environments falls below 2.5. Once on probation, the student is expected to maintain at least a 2.75 GPA for each succeeding quarter's work until the GPA for upper division college courses exceeds 2.5.

Drop: If a student does not maintain a 2.75 quarterly GPA while on probation, the student will be dropped from the construction management program and be coded as a pre-major.

Appeals: A student, who is dropped under this policy, may file a written appeal to the Department Chair within 15 working days after the drop letter was dated. The appeal should state the facts the student believes justify reconsideration and include supporting justification. The Chair will review the facts and render a decision within 15 working days after the appeal is received.

Student Conduct Code

Academic misconduct encompasses plagiarism, cheating on examinations or on individual project assignment, and theft or alteration of other's work on academic materials for the purpose of improving one's own grades or acquiring academic credit. Students accused of academic misconduct will be referred for disciplinary action pursuant to the University Student Conduct Code, Washington Administrative Code 468-120, (http://www.washington.edu/students/handbook/conduct.html).
