Explanation of and Rationale for Proposed Changes to Disability Studies Minor

October 4, 2010

These changes to the existing Disability Studies minor requirements are meant to address three issues: the creation of a new class code (DIS ST) for the program; the creation of a new larger format introductory class (DIS ST/LSJ/CHID 230) in place of the previous introductory course (DIS ST/LSJ/CHID 332); and a change from the "Internship or Independent Study" requirement into a "Capstone" requirement.

The course change requests related to the new class code for Disability Studies have been turned in at the same time as this form, along with requests for the creation of a handful of new courses. Although these changes will make Disability Studies curricula appear somewhat more distinct, this is not meant to change the continuing strong and fruitful relationship with the programs in Law, Societies, and Justice and Comparative History of Ideas. Advising for the minor and administration of it will not be changed or altered by these proposed changes to the minor requirements. Both LSJ and CHID have been extensively consulted in the creation of these changes to the Disability Studies minor requirements.

The new introductory course (DIS ST/LSJ/CHID 230) is a larger-sized course that will be offered once per year to about 100 students. It takes the curricular place of DIS ST/LSJ/CHID 332, which was offered three times a year to about 35 students each time. A once-yearly course of larger size will reduce the cost of instruction, allowing the program's funding to cover the new courses being created.

The third issue to be addressed by these proposed changes to the minor is the creation of a better functioning capstone requirement to the minor. To date, students have been asked to find an internship or independent study related to topics covered in Disability Studies and then to sign up for at least 5 credits of coursework with faculty in Disability Studies or in a closely-related field of study. Because Disability Studies is an interdisciplinary program with faculty appointed throughout campus, the independent study and internship course numbers used to complete this requirement were borrowed from an ever-changing variety of programs. This requirement has been difficult to administer by the adviser and has normally required significant one-on-one explanation to students and faculty. The purpose of the requirement has been to create an academic bridge between what is being studied in classes and what is occurring in the "real world." The new capstone requirement is to be fulfilled by a course meant to do the same thing, but in a more easily-controlled classroom environment (DIS ST 435). This course will draw on the theoretical, historical, political, social, and cultural ideas developed in the Disability Studies Core Courses and Electives and apply them to specific hypothetical "cases." This change to the requirements will make the minor vastly easier to advise and to administer.

All of these changes to courses and requirements are intended to make the minor more visible and understandable to interested students and to advisers throughout campus. The changes will make better and more functional use of the resources (budgets, faculty, and advising) that we have. And they will allow for the possibility of growth during more favorable budgetary times.
