





EXPLANATION OF AND RATIONALE FOR PROPOSED CHANGE

In this application we propose two changes to the Anthropology major. First is the addition of an Archaeological Sciences Option. Second is the addition of ARCHY 495 to the list of courses that satisfy the statistics requirement for the major.

The Archaeological Sciences Option is recommended to students who are interested in an in-depth study archaeological methods and theory. The study of archaeological methods and theory concentrates on the relationship between the material traces of human activity and the actions and natural processes that result in these traces. The required courses in this option will equip students with specialized laboratory and field skills and provide them with historical context for understanding contemporary issues in archaeological science.

Creating an Archaeological Sciences Option will encourage students to pursue the study of archaeology by making them aware that an ordered and logical course of study is available. Organizing this course of study as a transcripted Option allows students' academic work and expertise in archaeology to be recognized on their official transcript, which will help them in their applications to graduate programs or to gain employment.

We also would like to add ARCHY 495 to the list of courses that will satisfy the statistics requirement for the Anthropology major. This course is titled 'Quantitative Archaeological Analytic Techniques' and the course catalog description reads: "Introduction to quantitative approaches to archaeological problems; data screening, numeric methods of classification and identification, graphical and computer-based seriation techniques, and the analysis of spatial patterning in artifact distributions." This is a course in advanced statistical analysis for archaeology students that we believe encompasses the content of CS&SS 221/SOC 221/STAT 221, STAT 220, STAT 311 and Q SCI 381. If ARCHY 495 is approved as a course that satisfies the statistics requirement then student who receive a passing grade for ARCHY 495 will not need to take those CS&S/SOC/STAT/Q SCI courses. This will shorten students' time to complete their degree and reduce redundancy in their major requirements.

Department Admission Requirements

Students are notified of the admission decision by the end of week five of the quarter in which they apply.

55 credits as follows:

- *Core courses* (20 credits): ARCHY 205, BIO A 201; any 200-level ANTH course; and one of the following: CS&SS 221/SOC 221/STAT 221, STAT 220, STAT 311, Q SCI 381
- 35 additional ANTH, ARCHY, and BIO A credits distributed across the subfields or concentrated as suits the interests of the student. 20 of these credits must be in upper-division (300- or 400-level) courses. Students may count one 100-level ANTH, ARCHY, or BIO A course toward the major, but are not required to do so.
 - The following AIS courses may apply toward this requirement: AIS 201, AIS 202, AIS 203, AIS 240, AIS 311, AIS 312, AIS 316, AIS 317, AIS 330, AIS 335, AIS 340, AIS 443.
 - Maximum 12 credits (18 credits for departmental honors students) from ANTH 499, ARCHY 499, and BIO A 499 combined can be counted toward the major.
- *Additional major requirements:*
 - Courses with a grade of 1.9 or lower do not count toward the major.
 - At least 25 credits in the major must be completed with a minimum grade of 2.5.
 - Transfer students must complete a minimum of 15 upper-division credits in anthropology at the UW.

- Admission to the MAGH and AG options is competitive. Meeting minimum requirements for admission to the major does not guarantee admission to either option. Applications are available on the department website on the first day of the quarter. Application deadline is the second Friday of autumn, winter, or spring quarters. Students are notified of the admission decision by the end of week five of the quarter in which they apply.

Note: Admission to the archaeological sciences (ASc) option is not competitive and is open to all students accepted into the Anthropology major. A passing grade in ARCHY 205 is required for admission to the archaeological sciences (ASc) option.

- *Core courses* (20 credits): ARCHY 205, BIO A 201; any 200-level ANTH course; and one of the following: CS&SS 221/SOC 221/STAT 221, STAT 220, STAT 311, Q SCI 381, or ARCHY 495.
- 35 additional ANTH, ARCHY, and BIO A credits distributed across the subfields or concentrated as suits the interests of the student. 20 of these credits must be in

Anthropology of Globalization (AG) Option: Requirements for the general anthropology major, as shown above, to include 20 credits from courses in ANTH, ARCHY, and BIO A approved for the AG option. Approved courses available at the department advising office (243 Denny) or on the department website.

Archaeological Sciences (ASc) Option: Requirements for the general anthropology major, as shown above, to include 15 credits from ARCHY 480, 481, 482, 483, 484, 495 or 561 and at least 15 credits from courses approved for the ASc option.
