The Ethnomusicology BA degree emphasizes the study of music as culture as well as art. Students may be admitted to the degree program on the basis of a written application. Course requirements include selected courses in the School of Music's core curriculum, ethnomusicology courses encompassing diverse repertoires and topics, several interdisciplinary courses including at least one in socio-cultural anthropology, world music performance study, and a capstone senior project. In addition to the Ethnomusicology major requirements, students must also complete the General Education Requirements for the College of Arts and Science.

Bachelor of Arts with a major in Ethnomusicology Admission Requirements

Before applying, students must complete either Music 316 or Music 317 with a minimum grade of 3.0. Admission to the BA will be based on ethnomusicology faculty review of a student's transcript and statement of purpose, which should explain the student's interest in ethnomusicology and potential areas of specialization.

General Requirements

Minimum 180 credits, of which 90 must be taken in departments other than the School of Music. All College of Arts and Sciences graduation requirements must be met. Cumulative GPA of 2.50 for all music courses and a minimum grade of 2.0 for each music course counted toward the major.

Major Requirements

Ethnomusicology (57-73 credits): Music 201/204, 202/205, 203/206 (12 credits); Music 316, 317 (10 credits); three approved 400-level ethnomusicology courses (variable credit of 3 or 5 credits, so 9-15 credits total); six quarters of Musap 389 (variable credit of 2 or 3, so 12-18 credits); one approved sociocultural anthropology course (3 credits); two approved interdisciplinary electives (6-10 credits); 5 credits of senior study in Music 499

It would be helpful to provide more information about the selection criteria and process for students. The way the 1503 was submitted it could be interpreted as all students who take the music courses and achieve the grades specified would be eligible for the major.

I will let the Committee know that existing BA in Music already requires a 2.5 cum GPA and a minimum grade of 2.0 in each course; that may be enough, but I will not know for certain until they meet on Friday.

As I look at the catalog Music is set up a little differently from other majors. Would Ethnomusicology students complete the same Music core courses as the rest of the students or is it entirely different? I ask for clarity – I am assuming you want this as a separate major not an option under the existing BA in Music correct?

Prof. Dudley,

The questions SCAP asked for clarification on were the following:

- 1) Are admissions are competitive or minimum requirements and when can students apply? Can students declare the major any time after they have completed those 24 credits and the Music courses, or is there an additional admissions decision process to determine which of the students who meet the 3.0 grade and 2.5 cum GPA in the Music courses are the best fit for the major?
- 2) Majors are allowed to have higher grade requirements for admissions, that part was not in question. However, once students are admitted to the major any grade requirements above a cum 2.0 GPA in the courses required for the major requires additional justification, and any time a higher cum GPA or a minimum grade in a course is approved as graduation requirements the major must also establish a continuation policy.

I will be happy to pass along the answers to the above questions to SCAP at this Friday's meeting if you can get them to me in time.

Dear Jennifer,

I understand you asked for clarification of the admission requirements for the BA in Ethnomusicology that we are proposing to move from ISE to School of Music. Please see below.

Applicants to the BA in Ethnomusicology must first complete 24 credits of university coursework, including at least 6 credits in ethnomusicology courses such as Music 316 or 317 (5 credits), Musap 389 or other world music ensembles (1 credit), Music 160, Music 250, Music 445, or other 400-level ethnomusicology courses (3 credits). Applicants must have a cumulative GPA of 2.5, and a minimum grade of 3.0 in any ethnomusicology course.

These relatively high standards reflect the fact that Ethnomusicology BA students need to work independently, researching and writing a senior thesis and participating in courses with graduate students.
