The aim of our proposed minor in "History of Empire and Colonialism" is to better showcase the depth of comparative fields that History offers and to dismantle student ideas that History is bound only by time and location. We identified this theme after careful consultation with faculty about the courses (especially at the upper-division level) they teach and, thus, are confident that we have sufficient courses to support this and our three other proposed minors.  The student learning outcomes for our proposed new minors include:  • deepen intellectual coherence of History minors' courses of study;  • strengthen skills of critical analysis, synthesis, and written and oral expression by encouraging comparison, contrast, and connection of historical issues across diverse time periods and geographic locations;  • develop greater appreciation for the variety of methodologies and theories that historians use to interpret the past; and enhance understanding of the diversity and complexity of the human past to prepare students for careers and citizenship in an increasingly globalized world. # Proposed Catalog Copy: Minor in History of Empire and Colonialism

History of Empire and Colonialism: 30 credits from approved course list, of which 20 credits must be upper-division, with a minimum 2.00 cumulative GPA in courses applied towards the minor. A minimum of 15 of the 20 credits must be completed in residence at UW Seattle campus. Up to 5 credits may overlap with other minors.

#### Minor in History of Empire and Colonialism

This minor explores the historical development of imperial and colonial formations around the world, from ancient times to the current era of neoliberalism and globalization. How have imperial and colonial formations shaped larger processes and events in world history? And how have historical actors in both colonies and metropoles experienced, negotiated, advanced, and resisted imperial and colonial domination? Focusing on these broad questions, courses in the minor challenge students to investigate the common aspects of empire as a historical concept and political practice and to compare the various forms of imperial and colonial rule in different historical contexts. Themes and topics include: indigeneity, slavery, and race; colonial administration and structures of power; gender and sexual relations in law and in practice; labor systems, economic structures, and circuits of commercial and cultural exchange; wars and other forms of state violence; the politics of anti-colonialism, nationalism, decolonization, and postcoloniality.

Hi Jennifer,

I hope this message finds you well! Matt and Jon forwarded your email about the Empire and Colonialism minor and asked me to respond to Smidchens' comment. I am happy to do so.

I agree with Smidchens that encouraging students to study a foreign language is an excellent idea. Foreign language study is, in fact, something that our advisors and faculty already recommend in conversations with undergraduates in the History Department. I am, however, reluctant to make foreign language study a requirement for completion of the minor. One reason is that the number of additional credits that would be required in order to learn a language in a meaningful and useful way would be substantial, and would make the minor very difficult to complete. Alternatively, I would be very hesitant to reduce the number of History courses on empire and colonialism required for the minor in order to accommodate a language requirement.

It is probably worth noting that many of our courses for the Empire and Colonialism minor do achieve the goals that Smidchens sees as linked to language study. While our faculty certainly explore in their courses the imperial ideologies that structured the expansion of Western powers, most of them actually place much greater emphasis on questions of how non-English speaking colonized peoples understood, negotiated, and resisted colonization and imperial domination. As scholars who specialize in primary source analysis, moreover, many of our faculty incorporate native language sources as teaching tools, exploring questions of meaning and translation with students. Such approaches to teaching history provide students with a rich understanding of the worldviews of other cultures.
