The Social Work program faculty would like Justice (CJ) curriculum and learning outcome	to make the following ches.	nanges to the Minor in	n Criminal			
The minor currently consists of four core courses, T CRIM 200 Introduction to CJ (5cr), T CRIM 271 Introduction to the Sociology of Deviance and Social Control (5cr), T CRIM 360 Youth and Juvenile Justice Systems (5cr) and T CRIM 361 Addictions and Mental Illness in CJ (5cr) and 10-credits of electives from an approved list. The faculty would like to offer students more flexibility and require 15-credits of core courses and 15cr of approved electives.						
The faculty voted to drop T CRIM 360 Youth and Juvenile Justice Systems from the core courses and add it as an approved elective option instead.						
In addition, the faculty voted to add T CRIM 362 Criminological Theory (5cr) as a course option in lieu of T CRIM 271 (5cr) so that students could have a choice between T CRIM 271 or T CRIM 362.						
The following learning outcome will be deleted since this content is not available in the proposed 3 core courses (15cr) outlined above, "Gain an understanding of the consequences of incarceration on the families of the incarcerated, especially as it relates to parent-child relationships." (This content is still available in select approved elective courses.)						

The Social Work faculty voted on all of the above changes with 12 yes votes, 0 no and 0 abstain (2

faculty were absent) on June 6, 2013.

Requirements

The minor requires 30 credits (minimum of 20 credits in residence). There are four core courses required for a total of 20 credits and an additional 10 credits of electives chosen from an approved list of classes. At least 15 credits (core and elective combined) must be taken at the upper-division (300-400) level.

- T CRIM 360 Youth and Juvenile Justice Systems (5)
