Major Requirements

60 credits, to include:

- 1 At least one 5-credit course in four of the following six fields: Asia; Europe; Latin America and the Caribbean; Middle East and Africa; United States and Canada; and Comparative and Trans-regional
- 2 At least 10 credits in pre-modern history and 10 credits in modern history (as designated by the department)
- 3 At least 30 upper-division history credits completed in residence at the UW
- 4 5 credits of HSTRY 388, to be completed no later than within two quarters of declaring the major
- 5 5 credits of undergraduate senior seminar (as designated by the department)
- 6 Approved electives to reach 60 credits

Students wishing to complete thematic options within the major may choose from the following four options. The credit requirements for the options all count towards the 60 total credits for the major. HSTRY 388/494/498 do not count for the option requirements.

- Empire and Colonialism: 25 credits from approved course list, of which 15 credits must be upper division
- Race, Gender, and Power: 25 credits from approved course list, of which 15 credits must be upper division
- Religion and Society: 25 credits from approved course list, of which 15 credits must be upper division
- War and Society: 25 credits from approved course list, of which 15 credits must be upper division
- See the Department of History for an approved course list for all four options

A minimum 2.25 GPA for all history courses and minimum 2.0 grade in all history courses taken to fulfill requirements for the major.
