



Freshmen applicants to the University listing Business as their intended major are automatically considered. Admission is offered to students with exceptionally competitive academic records, including, but not limited to, high school GPA and SAT or ACT scores.</u></p> <p>Early Admission Group (EAG) This admission path is open to students who began their studies at the UW as freshmen, have been enrolled no more than three quarters, and have completed 30 graded credits at the UW.
