Freshman Admission Program (FRAP)

The School of Business Administration enrolls a small number of students each year directly out of high school, prior to necessary completion of any university-level prerequisites. Freshmen applicants to the University listing Business as their intended major are automatically considered. Admission is offered to students with exceptionally competitive academic records, including, but not limited to, high school GPA and SAT or ACT scores.

Early Admission Group (EAG)

This admission path is open to students who began their studies at the UW as freshmen, have been enrolled no more than three quarters, and have completed 30 graded credits at the UW. Courses completed prior to applying must include ECON 200; MATH 112, 124, 127, or 145; an approved English composition course chosen from C LIT 240, ENGL 104-105, 111, 121, 131, 182, 197, 198, 199, or 281; and pre-college test scores (ACT or SAT). General education or elective courses can be taken to complete the minimum of 30 graded credits.

Upper-Division Admission Group (UAG)

Students must present a minimum of 60 academic credits at the time of application including the following graded credits: ACCTG 215; ECON 200 or 201; MATH 112, 124, 127, or 145; an approved English composition course, chosen from C LIT 240, ENGL 104-105, 111, 121, 131, 182, 197, 198, 199, or 281. The EDP application and all supporting materials must be on file by April 15, October 15, and January 15, respectively. Transfer Applicants: Qualified applicants with at least 45 credits and a minimum 2.85 GPA who meet University admission requirements, but not Business School requirements, are eligible to be placed in the College of Arts and Sciences as pre-business majors.

Evening Degree Program Group (EDPG)

Students applying to the Evening Degree Program must meet the same admission requirements as the Upper Division Admission Group, plus have a demonstrable need to take courses in the evening rather than the day.

Explanation of proposed changes or new programs (continued):

One of the barriers we believe exists for potential Business Evening Degree students is that we accept applications only once a year. Unlike day students, many Evening Degree students complete our prerequisites only one or two courses at a time, given their other commitments, making it particularly problematic for them if they can't finish all of the prerequisites by the April deadline for Autumn admission. Delaying their entrance by a year is something we suspect may cause them to seek other bachelor's degree options.

Consequently, we would like to allow students to apply to our Evening Degree Program three times per year: for admission Autumn, Winter, and Spring. Philosophically, we believe this would be in keeping with the University's goal of providing educational access to these "time-bound" students. Logistically, we can accommodate two additional application periods per year because the number of applicants is small. (We could never do three admission periods per year for the day program unless we added considerable staff.) By creating a separate application for the Evening Degree Program, we hope to keep confusion regarding application deadlines for the various "admission groups" to a minimum.
