Proposed Catalog Statement

DESCRIPTION OF MINOR: The Labor Studies Minor brings together a series of courses on labor in core social science departments. It provides students with an interdisciplinary program of study focusing on the importance of labor to the economic, social, political, and cultural evolution of modern societies.

MINOR REQUIREMENTS: 30 total credits. All students pursuing the Minor are required to take the core course, Introduction to Labor Studies (cross-listed as HIST 249, POL S 249, SOC 266). Students complete the additional 25 credits (no more than 10 credits from any one department) from the following: HIST 449, HSTAA 450, HSTAA 480, POL S 405, POL S 447, SOC 447, SOC 466, AES 361, CHSTU 354, ECON 443, ECON 444W, HRMB 420. Students must maintain an overall grade point average of at least 2.5, and must receive at least a 2.0 in all courses applied toward the Minor.
